## Did You Know...About John Wesley -- by the editors of Christian History Institute

...John Wesley (1703-1791) was one of eighteen children, eight of whom died in infancy.

...Before John and Charles Wesley went to Georgia as missionaries in 1735, they consulted their mother, who said, "If I had twenty sons, I should rejoice if they were all so employed, though I should never see them more."

...He *never intended* to form a church separate from the Anglican Church. The separation occurred as a result of his personally ordaining preachers destined for America after the Revolutionary War. "Ordination is separation."

...John Wesley rode far enough on horseback to circle the earth 10 times. He rode 250,000 miles! He was convinced that it was important for him personally to spread the gospel through relationships and continue to grow closer to God in those relationships.

...At John Wesley's death in 1791 his followers numbered 79,000 in England and 40,000 in America, but by 1957 there were 40 million Methodists worldwide! *[ed. note: In 2014 there were an estimated 12 million Methodists in the world...about 7 million in the U.S.]*
