The Stinemetz Family—by Marsha Clayborne

(Ed. note: Marsha Clayborne has been inspired to research the history of families whose names appear on the stained glass windows at Hopewell UMC. At "Hopewell's Got Talent" in January, she displayed her talent by describing the life accomplishments of Elmer J. Brown. Here is another product of her studies.)

John W. Stinemetz was born in Germany in 1756 and came to this country soon after birth. At Hagerstown, Maryland, John married Hannah Hays of Virginia. Nine children were born in this union, George, Henry, Solomon, John, Abraham, Nancy, Isaac, Hannah, and Samuel. In 1826, the family moved to Knox County.

Abraham Stinemetz was the 5th child to John and Hannah Stinemetz. He was born in 1800. He married Catherine Lahmon in Knox County on March 30, 1830. They had five children: Elizabeth, Abraham, John, Alva, and James. Abraham died in 1830 and is buried in the Hopewell cemetery. The Stinemetz family lived in Knox County for many years.

Alva Stinemetz was the $4^{\rm th}$ son of Abraham and Catherine. He was born in 1838 and grew up in Pleasant Township. He married Mary Smith, daughter of J.B. Smith and Mary Brewer on

December 30, 1869. They had seven children. Angeline, Benton, Howard, Clinton, Mary, Lenna, and Susan. The family lived on Hopewell Road and attended the Hopewell Methodist Episcopal Church.

Clinton Stinemetz was grandfather to Jean Riley and Eleanor Doup. Clinton and Gertrude Steinmetz had 8 children, Marie, Lawrence, Dale, Ila, Robert, Helen, Floyd, and Richard; Eleanor Doup's father is Lawrence and Ila is Jean Riley's mother. Somewhere along the line, the spelling of the Stinemetz name was changed to Steinmetz.

Besides going to church, the children attended the Hopewell School. The ladies were members of the Ladies Aid or UMW today. The families were involved in the Pleasant Grange. Besides farming, Clinton served 39 years as clerk for Pleasant Township.

Clinton's oldest daughter, Marie, attended the Hopewell School and later returned in 1922 as a teacher. Marie attended Ohio University in Athens and later The Ohio State University. She taught at the Morgan School in 1921 on Martinsburg Road and the Hopewell School in 1922. She also taught Sunday school at the Hopewell Church.

The first Stinemetz reunion was held at Riverside Park in 1926. The Steinmetz family still meets every year for their family reunion today. Several Steinmetz/Stinemetz family members still attend Hopewell United Methodist Church.

Did You Know...About John Wesley? (Part 2) -- by the editors of Christian History Institute

Because of the enormous output of publications designed for the common man, John Wesley has been called *"The Father of the Religious Paperback."* Sermons, tracts, pamphlets of every kind—numbering around 5000 items came from his pen!

When John and Charles Wesley founded the "Holy Club" at Oxford in 1729, not more than five or six members of the House of Commons went to church at all!

When John Wesley had his "heart strangely warmed" on May 24, 1738, he was already ordained as a minister of the Anglican Church!

The greatest success of Methodism was not among the rich and "successful" but among the poor; but ironically, *simple commoners were often the very ones who persecuted* Wesley and the open-air preachers most!

For all the power of his eyes and voice, John Wesley measured *five-feet-three inches tall and weighed 128 pounds!*


by Joan Coon and Ellen Kaiser. Barb started the meeting, and the secretary and treasury report was given along with dues and missions collected.

Jean scheduled volunteers for the 24-hour call-in hotline.

New Directions provides the hotline, safe housing, sexual violence advocacy, group support, and more...free of charge. 

Highlights of Church Council Meeting

A group of 12 met on March 19 to hear reports and discuss the business of Hopewell UMC. Finance, Pastor-Parish and UMW reports are summarized elsewhere in this newsletter. Trustees:

- 1. Spring Cleanup will be scheduled for May 6 from 9 AM to 2 PM.
- 2. Wiring and lighting need to be upgraded, and trustees are inviting ideas on locating outlets and lights and are calling on a lighting expert for advice—with priority to preserving the architectural integrity. They requested and were granted a budget of up to \$15K for the project.
- 3. The fuel oil furnace will need to be replaced, probably within two years. Ohio Cumberland (Mark Ramser) has offered to run the gas line under two roads to the church at no charge—a savings of at least \$8K. A natural gas furnace could be in place by next heating season. The system would require ductwork changes but would retain the current grates…and would include air conditioning. Trustees were granted a budget of \$7,500 for the project.
- 4. Cabinets and countertops, being planned for the north wall of the Sunday school room, would include plumbing for a (future) sink and outlets for multiple crockpots. Trustees will gather estimates for the project.
- 5. Projects completed in the past two years include: roofing, drainage, parking, painting, bell restoration, and sound system.

Pastor Lee reviewed the list of committee assignments (to be published in a future newsletter). Some committees need more members.

Old business: Bill reported on progress in restoring broken tombstones in the cemetery, a project which he, his hired hand Ivan, and grandson Seth have undertaken.

New business: Bill has developed an 'Evangelism Plan' for contacting neighbors, friends, acquaintances, and former members—with a goal of bringing others to Christ and increasing membership at HUMC. A number of ideas were offered, e.g., find new neighbors through realtors and county auditor; hold special events; visit neighbors with something in hand; and promote the benefits of a small church family.
