

A View from the Distaff Side - Katie Beran

As I shoveled a great deal of snow this morning (again), I tried to find some theology in it.

God's grace showered abundantly upon us? I couldn't get very far with that one, since I was not exactly glorifying the Maker of all this white stuff.

How about sin, and its continuing presence in our lives? Again, it was not a good fit—granted, the snow kept falling (and falling and falling...) just like sin keeps rearing its ugly head in my life, but how was shoveling it into neat piles off the driveway doing any good? I just could not make it make any sense.

Instead, I turn to my wonderful nephew, Jack. He is one of my favorite people.

Jack is a sophomore at the University of Dayton, and a very spiritual young man. He has even established a "blog" on which to publish his thoughts on the role of Christ and His church in our lives. I was never that brave about my Christianity at his age! He truly wants to make a difference in the lives of those who read his musings, and I think that he will.

However, as I read the fourth of his postings, I was reminded of the origin my eighth-grade teacher gave for the term "sophomore." She said that we call them sophomores because they think they are very wise.

Jack is indeed very wise for his years. I think that he is far wiser than I was at his age. Fortunately, God's plan is that we all add to our wisdom as we mature. Jack has great potential.

For example, this morning, he posted "5 New Year's Resolutions You Should Make." These included reading the Bible, witnessing to Christ in our daily lives, attending church more frequently, praying, and practicing humility. Who can argue with that?!?

Well, think about it for a minute.

First off, at my advanced age (and wisdom?), I have learned that it is never wise to use the words "you" and "should" in the same sentence. I surely have too many "I should's" to give anyone an opinion as to what they should. The most important thing I learned in 2005 was to never offer advice. Jack is sharp enough to learn that someday.

Second, I would change all his verbs. Those of us a little farther along in our walk with our Lord know that <u>reading</u> the Bible is never enough! We <u>study</u> the words, we <u>study</u> the meaning, and we <u>study</u> the application to our own lives. Reading does not take us far enough.

Witnessing is almost right, but our responsibility as Christ's saved is more to bring Christ into every part of every contact we make with every person we meet.

Attending church really misses the mark to me! I once heard that sitting in a pew does not make me a Christian any more than sitting in the garage makes me a car. I must <u>live</u> Christ's church...and make it a part of my being.

Praying is, of course, important, but once we have a true relationship with our beloved Father, begging, entreating, pleading for the needs of ourselves and others is probably closer to what we really do.

Practice humility? No, it is more that I need to totally subject myself to the will of my powerful and loving God, and walk in His ways. That makes me more than humble, it takes me from my present state of "I Surrender Some" to the place where I long to be.

I do think that Jack is on the right track and applaud his wonderful enthusiasm and courage to put his thoughts right out there for all to read. I guess the lesson for me is somewhere in Titus 2, which admonishes us to teach, encourage, and move all to God's place for them.

Aunt Katie needs to keep Jack writing and learning!

Calendar Notes

Sunday, January 6 – Epiphany, Communion

Epiphany, which traditionally falls on January 6, is a Christian feast day that celebrates the revelation of God the Son as a human being in Jesus Christ. Western Christians commemorate principally (but not solely) the visitation of the Biblical Magi to the Baby Jesus, and thus Jesus' physical manifestation to the Gentiles. Eastern Christians commemorate the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River, seen as his manifestation to the world as the Son of God. --from Wikipedia

Sunday, January 13 - The Baptism of Our Lord

The Baptism of the Lord commemorates Christ's Baptism by St. John the Baptist. Traditionally, the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord was celebrated on January 13, the octave (eighth) day of Epiphany. – from Catholicism.about.com

Sunday, February 3 - Communion

Sunday, February 10 – Transfiguration

The Transfiguration is an event in the New Testament in which Jesus is transfigured (or metamorphosed) and becomes radiant upon a mountain. The Synoptic Gospels (Matthew 17:1–9, Mark 9:2-8, Luke 9:28–36) describe it, and 2 Peter 1:16–18 refers to it.

In these accounts, Jesus and three of his apostles go to a mountain (the Mount of Transfiguration). On the mountain, Jesus begins to shine with bright rays of light. Then the prophets Moses and Elijah appear next to him and he speaks with them. Jesus is then called "Son" by a voice in the sky, assumed to be God the Father, as in the Baptism of Jesus. --from Wikipedia

Wednesday, February 13 - Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday, in the calendar of Western Christianity, is the first day of Lent and occurs 46 days before Easter. It is a moveable fast, falling on a different date each year because it is dependent on the date of Easter. It can occur as early as February 4 or as late as March 10.

According to the canonical gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, Jesus spent 40 days fasting in the desert before the beginning of his public ministry, during which he endured temptation by Satan. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of this 40-day liturgical period of prayer and fasting.

Ash Wednesday derives its name from the practice of placing ashes on the foreheads of adherents as a sign of mourning and repentance to God. The ashes used are typically gathered after the palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday are burned. *--from Wikipedia*

Sunday, February 17 – 1st Sunday in Lent. Easter is March 31.


