Pastor's Ponderings -- Pastor Lee Cubie Work, God's Gift for Good Character

I like to think about summer. Especially after the cold snap and icy weather we have been having. What shapes my memories of summer are the idylls of my childhood. I didn't grow up on a farm; if I had, perhaps how I think of summer may be a bit different. But as it was, I did not grow up on a farm. I grew up the son of a pastor and of a typist of dissertations who worked hard and transformed themselves into college professors. They were very loving and worked to give their children the best they could. In other words, I lived a sheltered life with fond summer memories.



I grew up in Massachusetts. There, the school year generally ended on the first full day of summer, June 21st. My birthday was June 24th, making the beginning of summer an especially memorable moment. My parents were frugal and so gifts were not lavish. What my mother did to celebrate birthdays was to cook our favorite meal. Mine was mostly predictable. I asked for a T-bone steak, baked potato, and corn on the cob. That meal, and especially corn on the cob, meant summer. Summer was an idyll. A time of dreaming. Exploration with friends a must. "Lassie" and "Rin Tin Tin," were on television, as well as "Leave It to Beaver" and "My Three Sons." And who could forget the "Andy Griffith Show?" As you can see it was a time that encouraged youthful dreaming and exploration. Troubles were not allowed to cast shadows in our entertainment. And my parents were keen not to allow them to shadow our childhoods.

I am no longer a child. I have been given sixty-three years to grow into adulthood. Though, I remember those times fondly, they are now like morning mist on a hot dry August evening. Now I know how crucial hard work is. Not for financial gains, but to strength of good character. Strength of good character is essential for a good life. Strength of good character is what the scriptures are about. The gospel of Jesus Christ is how we aspire to it. Paul testifies to this hard work, "Not that I have already obtained this or am already perfect; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Brethren, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but one thing I do, forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus. Let those of us who are mature be thus minded...." (*Phil. 3:12-15a*) That "upward call," is perfection of God's holy love in

our lives. It will be fully known and realized at the resurrection, what he has not "already obtained." While he is alive, he is to work towards this "upward call." He is to "forget what lies behind." That is his past sinful behavior, as well as the guilt and death that accompanied it. That is because "Jesus has made him his own." Work is also seen as a necessary component of love.



His advice to Christians who are thieves is to "no longer steal, but rather let him labor, doing honest work with his hands, so he might be able to give to those in need." (Eph. 4:28) Idleness is also seen as an opportunity for evil. In I Timothy 5:9-16, Paul gives advice to Timothy as to how to order the community of Christ. Widows were to be supported by the church, but there were stipulations. They were to be sixty and older and of good reputation, the wife of one husband. Young widows were to "marry, have children and

rule their household." This was because the temptation to be "idlers, gadding about from house to house, and not only idlers but gossips and busy bodies, saying what they should not."

This season we are in is about work. We remember and celebrate God's good work in creation. We have come through Advent and Christmas. We are now in Epiphany heading into Lent, which celebrates the work of God to redeem mankind and creation. Romans 8:19-21 reads, "For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the sons of God; for creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of him who subjected it in hope; because the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and obtain the glorious liberty of the children of God."

There is so much more that the scriptures can teach us about work. Let it suffice that we are meant for work. It is a blessing from God. "We know that in everything God works for good with those who love him, who are called according to his purpose." (Rom. 8:28) Work, therefore, because "our commonwealth is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will change our lowly body to be like his glorious body, by the power which enables him even to subject all things to himself.

"Therefore, my brethren, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm thus in the Lord, my beloved." (*Phil. 3:20-4:1*)

Ten different workshops were offered, and attendees could participate in two of them, due to the event ending at 12:30 p.m. (Each session lasting 1 hour).

"A Place of Prayer – the Life of the Congregation" and "Leading Others to Lead" were the workshops I attended. Both of the "presenters" (each was a pastor), were excellent – sharing the opportunities and the "vision" we can all encounter in our journey with outreach and evangelism – leading others to Christ.

The ideas I received by attending were shared with our PPR Committee on January 25th. Bob attended the session on "Creating a Culture for an Effective Church." A church culture can range from inspiring to toxic. Strategies for building an effective culture include:

- -Build relationships and great teamwork
- -Have regular conversations about your vision and values
- -Ask questions and listen
- -Share stories about successes




Is your church as concerned as the coffee shop down the street about keeping your current people and attracting new people? It takes work to keep a business or a church healthy and growing.
