Pastor's Ponderings -- Pastor Lee Cubie Easter, a Human Story

Easter this year falls on April 17th. Easter is the most fantastic story in the bible. It is about a man named Jesus who perfectly obeys the law until his death. There he falls afoul of the law. In Deuteronomy 21:22-23 we read this law, "And if a man has committed a crime punishable by death, and you hang him upon a tree (or cross), his body shall not remain all night upon the tree, but you shall bury him the same day, for *a hanged man is accursed by God*; you shall not defile your land which the LORD your God gives you for an inheritance." In this one law we find how a blameless man was made to be our sin.

How blatantly unfair that a man who always did the will of the Father should die such an inglorious death. We learn in Genesis that Adam died because he was not obedient. From this we learn that "sin came into the world through one man, and so death spread to all men because all men sinned". (Rom. 5:12) Yes, Jesus was made to sin, but ironically, he did it willingly in obedience to the Father. (Mk. 14:36) So, what was sin became righteousness through obedience. And through righteousness came life. As it is written, "as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign through righteousness to eternal life through our Lord Jesus Christ." (Rom. 5:21)

Truly then, Easter is a human story brought about by God. If Jesus had not become a man, we would still be lost in our sins because of what that one man, Adam, did.

Easter is a human story for us too. Jesus is not the only person to receive the resurrection. Resurrection is central to the Christian message. Paul teaches, "I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received, that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures". (1 Cor. 15:3-4) We are participants for we learn that Christ is not to be raised alone and that without the resurrection there is no gospel. "For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins." (1 Cor. 15:16-17) Easter is not just for Jesus it is also for us.

The parable of the Prodigal Son is about us. It is about each and every one of us. It is very human. Jesus closes the parable with these words, "for this my son was dead, and is alive again". (Lk. 15:24a) Those are words of resurrection. The parable is about our resurrection. It is about the beginning of our resurrection. We await the day when it is completed and we can know the fullness of our forgiveness found in newness of life.


Barnabas Project - initiated by Linda Joseph



HUMC Council Meeting Notes - February 27, 2022 - Bob Joseph, recording secretary

Church Council Chair Bill Lawhon called the meeting to order at 10:35 AM in the church sanctuary with 14 attending.

Committee Reports:

Finance: Co-treasurers Donna Spinks and Phyllis Gourley gave a financial report of results for calendar year 2021. In summary, the general funds balance is \$99,528.54 (about \$6K ahead of the previous year), and the Building Maintenance/Improvement funds balance is \$42,449.82. A certificate of deposit is coming due this week; instead of reinvesting, the funds will be held available for an expected expenditure: Church siding replacement (see Trustees report). They also presented a 2022 budget of \$36,365 that included \$18,350 for ministerial support, \$13,325 for other local church expenses, and \$4,690* for conference/district apportionments, (utilities, insurance, building improvement, worship/program expenses, etc.). *The actual conference/district apportionments amount is not yet available; the budget figure is based on the 2021 amount and not expected to be materially different. Jade Laymon moved (Julie Britton seconded) to adopt the budget; motion passed.

Pastor-Parish Relations: Jade Laymon reported that PPR members have met and prepared/submitted all the required reports.


Trustees: Bill Lawhon reported (for Head Trustee Mickey Gourley) that trustees are getting bids to replace the church siding, which does not hold paint, and they will seek congregational approval for the expense. Bill said that issues with the cemetery (leaning and fallen tombstones, drainage) will be addressed after the siding project is tackled.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Lee Cubie noted that Hopewell UMC seems to be growing and attendance is restoring with several new visitors attending. He said his health is improving. Hopewell is a wonderful church with a heart for serving God. He praised the women of the church for their initiative in preparing the "Guidelines for community spending."

New Business: The "Proposed Guidelines for community spending by the Hopewell congregation," drafted by a committee of eight, was discussed and adopted with several suggestions (Phyllis Gourley moved, Julie Britton seconded, motion passed). Among the refinements: 1) Monetary and in-kind support will be offered for Knox Recovery, Todd Wells's addiction treatment/recovery initiative, 2) For funeral support, food could be homemade, and flowers could be homegrown, and 3) High school graduates from 2022 and 2021 will be presented with Bibles from the congregation. Church cleanup dates were included in the document: May 7 and September 10, 2022. Jade Laymon has agreed to chair this committee to implement the guidelines.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:05 AM.





Hopewell Church History

←This map, located several years ago by Bill Lawhon in the Knox County Engineer's office, places a Hopewell Meeting House on East Union (now Hopewell) Road in 1841, over 180 years ago. A second meeting house (below), built in 1855, was replaced by the current church in 1916.
