Pastor's Ponderings -- Pastor Lee Cubie E Pluribus Unum, Out of the Many One



As we move into the months of June and July, we will be celebrating holidays that remind us of our core values. Memorial Day, I know it is technically in May, but it feels like June, and July Fourth.

July Fourth or Independence Day celebrates our independence from the British Empire. It is truly a celebration of E Pluribus Unum. Out of the thirteen colonies a nation was forged, and many became united to be free from a tyrannous relationship with Britain.

On Memorial Day we remember all those who have died serving our nation. It was initially instituted to remember those who died in the War Between the States, commonly known as the Civil War. It is a memorial to those brave men and women

who died to give freedom to all who would live peaceably together. It does, in its own way, celebrate that all mankind is created equal in the eyes of God.

The origin of the phrase, e pluribus unum, is found in antiquity. Because of this there is more than one story as to its origin. The story I prefer and speculate to be the origin for our founding fathers comes from "Cicero's paraphrase of Pythagoras in his *De Officiis*, as part of his discussion of basic and social bonds as the origin of societies and states: 'When each person loves the other as much as himself, it makes one out of many (*unum fiat ex pluribus*), as Pythagoras wishes things to be in friendship.'" We encounter similar ideals in our faith. John 17 is especially constructed to emphasize unity. Only the unity he writes about is the unity that begins with the Father and the Son. It is in that unity that we as Christians live. Jesus prays for the unity that he and the Father share to be shared by all of us. That unity is not forced upon us, we are drawn into it by the love of the Father for the Son and the love of the Father and the Son for us.

This unity is part of the prayer of Jesus. John 17:20ff reads, "I do not pray for these only, but also for those who believe in me through their word, that they may all be one; even as thou, Father, art in me, and I in

thee, that they also may be in us..." We are to be united with the Father, with the Son, and with one another—out of the many one—e pluribus unum.

We become one through belief, "who believe in me..." True belief can never be forced nor can true unity. True unity comes out of the divine human comity. This comity, this friendly harmony, comes because we abide in the Father and the Son and they in us. All of this is through the Spirit.

This unity serves a purpose beyond the established unity it is also for the express purpose of bringing the world into a believing unity, "I in them and thou in me, that they may become perfectly one, so that the world may know that thou hast sent me and hast loved them even as thou hast loved me." (In 17:23) When we express this unity, we live out Christ's dictum, "By this all men will know you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (In 13:35)

In this is true e pluribus unum, that "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." (In 3:16)








God's creatures in our midst.





From the archives...

A surprise awaited those who tore down the old Hopewell meeting house in 1915, as they prepared to build the current structure on the same site. This article in the Mt. Vernon Democratic Banner newspaper (April 13, 1915) pieced together some details...and left an unsolved mystery.





Of A Decade Ago Is Revived On Monday

When Stolen Goods Are Discovered In A Church

Gambler, April 13—Recollection of a robbery which occurred over a decade ago was revived yesterday with the discovery in Hopewell church of a portion of the stolen goods, securely hidden away directly under the very spot where many sermons have since been delivered denouncing such vices as thlevery.

The discovery was made by Harry Smith of this village. The church is being excavated and while engaged in this work Mr. Smith had occasion to tear up the platform which is used as a pulpit. To his surprise, a number of nondescript articles were brought to light. Chief among these were two packages of smoking tobacco, two pairs of suspenders and several toothbrushes. The smoking tobacco attracted his attention and he opened a sack. Therein was one of the coupons frequently given by tobacco dealers to be redeemed in premiums. The coupon bore the date of 1899.

Recalling the robbery of many years previous Mr. Smith telephoned the store of C. G. Scott & Son in Gambier, narrating the circumstances of finding the tobacco and stating the date on the coupon. Mr. Scott instantly recalled that his store bad been broken into in 1898 and that no trace of the robbers or the stolen merchandise had ever been discovered.

There is little doubt but that the articles uncovered by Mr. Smith are the same taken away from the Scott store in the robbery of 1898. The motives of the thief or thieves in hiding them in the church can only be accounted for by the fact that they were probably closely pursued and took this means of disposing for the time being of incriminatory evidence, intending to return later which was never done.
